British Holidays

What are the bank holidays and how can you divide British holidays?

Bank holidays are public holidays in Britain, originally called so as banks were closed on these special days. We can divide British holidays into two groups: holidays connected with Anglo-Saxon tradition (Halloween) and religious holidays celebrated in all Christian countries in the world (Christmas, Easter...).

How is Christmas celebrated in Britain?

It starts on **December 24th (Christmas Eve)** when families decorate their houses with coloured paper, paperballs and chains, **holly with red berries, ivy, mistletoe** and the Christmas tree. They say that people who stand under the mistletoe should kiss and wish something. On the mantelpiece there are **Christmas** cards wishing Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

Shops are open until late in the evening so that last minute shopping for presents can be done.

In every house there is the nativity scene or the crib with Three Wise Man, shepherds, camels and baby Jesus. Children hope that **Father Christmas** will come down the chimney and bring some presents for them at night. So there are smaller presents in the **X-mas stockings** and larger presents are under the tree. Children get up very early in the morning on **December 25th** to open the presents and play with new toys. They also watch TV and sing **Christmas carols**.

The day after Christmas is also a national holiday, known as **Boxing Day**. Many British make contributions to churches and charities and the delivery people and others who have provided personalized services throughout the year are tipped.

What do the British eat at Christmas?

They have Christmas dinner usually at noon or in the evening on Christmas Day and eat **roast turkey** with **chestnut stuffing**, vegetables and sauce and plum pudding with brandy. Sweet cakes stuffed with candied fruit.

How is Christmas pudding prepared?

How is New Year's Eve celebrated?

On New Year's Eve people go to church or attend parties, they stay up till midnight to see the old year out and drink a toast to the New Year and gather on squares, link arms and sing.

New Year's Day (January 1st) is often a time for receiving guests at home. Titles and decorations are also awarded by the King / Queen on this day.

American Holidays

Americans celebrate lots of festivals and holidays because they come from all over the world and practise many religions. They celebrate also a lot of holidays commemorating historical events from American history. Holidays in America are often family and community events. Many Americans travel long distances for family **gatherings** or **take vacations** during holidays.

Christmas is celebrated in the same way as in the UK. It is a very commercial holiday. Christmas trees, wreathes, holly and ribbons are the typical symbols of this season.

Independence Day commemorates **victory over the British** in American Civil War in 1776. It is a day of picnics, parades and flying the flag, parties, barbecues, concerts and fireworks. It is celebrated on **July 4th**.

Thanksgiving Day is celebrated on the **last Thursday of November** and it is the second most important holiday of the year after Christmas. The name of this festival comes from the time when Pilgrim Fathers settled in America in 1620, they suffered a lot during the first winter and half of them died. The next year the Native Americans taught them how to plant corn and other crops (pumpkins, barley, beans) so in autumn 1621 they celebrated the first harvest / their Thanksgiving Day for the first time. They also invited local Indians to the celebration.

Nowadays the Americans eat **roast turkey** and **pumpkin pie**, squashes and cranberries and they wish one another happy Turkey Day. They travel long distance to gather as a family and enjoy a four-day holiday. This is the day of gifts, charity and food for poor people.
